REPORTING 101

WHY REPORT?

Reporting scams that you experience or hear about is the *best* way to stop scammers. Many times, scam artists will target a specific community or area; so, it's likely that others around you have experienced the same scam. Letting the right parties know helps them collect data, spot trends, and ultimately gives them the information they need to stop the bad guys.

WHO DO I REPORT TO?

With all the scams going on out there, it can be difficult knowing who to report them to. The Idaho Senior Medicare Patrol understands that and wants to help make things easier for you.
