- Financial exploitation outreach targeting vulnerable adult and elder population in Idaho.
- Standardized materials to support APS in providing a focused message of prevention, protection, and reporting.
- State Law, Federal Law, Policy, and Procedure:
 - Alignment of state and federal law regarding confidentiality and release of APS records.
 - Standardized response to requests for APS confidential records that are not properly served.
 - Advocate for strong support and hold law to delay redemptions for suspected elder and vulnerable adult exploitation investigations.
- Partnership to Expand Capacity of APS:
 - Create Integrated Mission Teams with trusted agencies and specialized professionals to support APS efforts.
 - Partner with state and/or federally funded agencies to identify and maximize resources for better outcomes of prevention, investigation, recovery, and prosecution.
 - Build trust with financial institutions to encourage cooperative efforts for investigation of vulnerable adult maltreatment.
